

The Short Version

Lawrence Nault is a speculative fiction writer, poet, and documentary storyteller whose work explores the intersection of ecological crisis, AI, identity, and justice. Rooted in the Badlands of Alberta and guided by a deep connection to the natural world, his stories challenge systems, honor silence, and seek meaning in the margins.

The Long Version:

Lawrence Nault is a purpose-driven storyteller working across speculative fiction, poetry, documentary film, and political commentary. His work is grounded in a deep reverence for the natural world and a steadfast belief in the power of words to provoke change. A self-described mountain hermit navigating the noise of the digital age, Nault brings a quiet yet unwavering voice to the forefront—one that stands firm in the face of injustice and dares to ask the questions others turn away from.

Rather than offering escape, his stories seek engagement. They peel back layers, challenge systems, and illuminate both harsh realities and hidden beauty. From the fragility of identity in an AIshaped future to the quiet resilience found amid ecological upheaval, Nault draws from lived experience and a profound connection to land and place.

Based in the Badlands of Alberta and guided by a life close to the earth—and two loyal collies—he approaches writing as both craft and calling. He believes stories are seeds: some take root immediately, others lie dormant until the world is ready. Either way, he writes for those who listen closely—for readers who find strength in silence, meaning in the margins, and hope in the hardest places.

Notable themes: Minimalism, digital detox, identity, ecological presence




Draconim (Ongoing Series)

A globally rooted eco-fiction series following teens bonded to dragons, each confronting environmental crises in their own region—from wildfire devastation to ocean plastic contamination. As environmental leaders, these youth embody grassroots change, resilience, and global solidarity.

Notable themes: Youth agency, environmental stewardship, cross-cultural collaboration, hope amid crisis



The Life of Phi

Speculative Fiction Novel | Available Now

A standalone work of speculative climate fiction exploring the consequences of algorithmic control in a world facing ecological collapse. As a powerful AI enforces environmental "balance" by sacrificing the vulnerable, a systems developer and an eco-rebel find themselves on opposite sides of a growing resistance. Through dual narratives, *The Life of Phi* examines power, data-driven inequality, and the cost of surrendering human judgment to machines.

Notable themes: Climate collapse, algorithmic control, resistance, environmental justice, grief, and moral complexity

After synchronized volcanic eruptions erupt across the globe, Earth is slowly sealed in a mysterious ice shell. MacIver Kids Adventures (Ongoing Series)

Middle Grade/YA Sci-Fi Adventure | Ages 11–15

This dynamic series follows a diverse group of adopted siblings whose foster family becomes entwined in interstellar mysteries. From the arrival of a telepathic alien child to the rediscovery of Atlantis beneath Europa's ice, and a desperate call for help from Saturn's moon Titan, the MacIver kids learn they're not just a family—they're guardians of the galaxy's forgotten worlds.



Sample Interview Questions for Lawrence Nault

Top 5 Interview Questions

For hosts, journalists, or moderators on tight timelines, here are five go-to questions to kick off a meaningful conversation with Lawrence Nault. These questions touch on the core of his work across fiction, poetry, film, and beyond.

- Your stories often explore the intersection of environment, AI, identity, and justice. What draws you to those themes, and how do they connect across your work?
- The Life of Phi imagines an AI managing Earth's climate using deeply flawed data. How does that story reflect real-world concerns about algorithmic bias and environmental decision-making?
- In the *Draconim* series, teens bonded to dragons lead grassroots environmental efforts. Why did you choose to center young people in that kind of global responsibility?
- Your documentary *Echoes of a Hermit* explores solitude and reconnection in a noisy world. How do you see silence and place shaping your creative voice?
 - From speculative fiction to poetry and film, your work spans many mediums. How do you decide what form a story should take—and what stays constant across all of them?

Family, Identity & The MacIver Kids

- The MacIver Kids Adventures series blends sci-fi with themes of adoption and belonging. What inspired that direction?
- How do you approach writing for the 11–15 age group in a way that respects their intelligence and emotional depth?
- How do you handle topics like disability and trauma in a way that's age-appropriate but honest?
- Do you see the family's arc as a metaphor for something larger?

Project-Specific Questions

The Life of Phi

- The world of The Life of Phi feels both speculative and unsettlingly familiar. What real-world issues or events most influenced the creation of this story?
- AI-Dieu is chilling precisely because it isn't malicious it's logical. Why did you choose to portray an AI antagonist that isn't evil, just indifferent?
- Water plays a central symbolic role in the novel as memory, force, and resistance. How did that imagery evolve as you wrote, and what does it represent to you?
- The novel presents two contrasting responses to systemic collapse: Quinn's passive complicity and Sahara's defiant resistance. How did you develop these opposing worldviews, and what drew you to that dual structure?
- You tackle some heavy themes environmental injustice, algorithmic bias, grief. How do you balance weighty material with engaging storytelling in fiction?
- Fiction often invites us to live inside moral gray areas. What role do you think novels like The Life of Phi play in helping readers question their own assumptions about technology, justice, and survival?
- If you could ask readers one question after they finish The Life of Phi, what would it be and why?

- What inspired you to write Rephlexions: Echoes of Existence? Was there a moment when the core idea really clicked for you?
- The novel contrasts two characters—Kaidan, who thrives within the RePHleX system, and Aria, who
 resists it. What drew you to explore this dichotomy, and how do they represent different responses to
 technology?
- RePHleX anticipates users' needs and offers seamless optimization, yet becomes a tool of control. Do you think we're already on that path in the real world?
- The resistance in your book isn't just about rebellion—it's about reclaiming perception and truth. Why did you choose to center the conflict around reality itself?
- Aria's analog art is a powerful symbol in the novel. What does it represent for you in contrast to digital culture?
- How did you approach worldbuilding for a society so deeply integrated with AI? What details were most important to get right?
- What do you hope readers take away from the story, especially in terms of their relationship with technology and convenience?
- If RePHleX were real, how do you think you would fare—more like Kaidan or Aria?

Inversion

- What was the original spark or idea that led you to write Inversion?
- The novel begins with simultaneous volcanic eruptions around the globe what kind of research did you do to ground that scenario in realism?
- The concept of a crystalline ice shell forming in the atmosphere is both beautiful and terrifying. What inspired that imagery?
- You blend speculative science with real geologic and environmental concerns how did you strike the balance between plausibility and imagination?
- The return of prehistoric creatures adds a whole new layer to the story. What role do these beings play in the broader themes of the novel?
- The characters face not just physical survival but moral and existential dilemmas. How did you approach writing their emotional journeys?
- With today's volcanic unrest like Mount Spurr and Kīlauea how does it feel to see real headlines
 echoing your fiction?
- If readers walk away with one lasting idea or emotion from Inversion, what do you hope it is?

- When did you realize it needed to become a documentary?
